

Dear friends and neighbors,

I am pleased to submit the annual report concerning the City of Bath's municipal activities for the fiscal operating period from July 1, 2021, to June 30, 2022 (hereinafter referred to as "FY 22"). In the pages that follow, you will find reports from our administrative departments, local legislators, and community partners, as well as financial statements from this operating period.

I am thankful for our employees and their dedicated service to the residents of the City, providing the functions that the community depends on while taking steps forward to make Bath a better place. I also want to acknowledge the efforts of the City Council and committee members whose hours of commitment and thoughtful decision-making help set policy for the City.

#### Highlights from FY22:

- Added a firefighter/emergency medical technician position with a plan to increase staffing to four shifts of six by FY 24.
- Voter-approved charter amendments in November 2021 reduced restrictions of the City's expenditure limitation and improved financial practices for the future.

- The Police Department received accreditation through the Maine Law Enforcement
- Accreditation Program. Completed Oak Grove Av-
- enue/Judkins Avenue/Old Brunswick Road street and Commercial Street sidewalk projects.







# City Council

Greetings Friends and Neighbors,

It is my honor to step up into the role of City Council Chair this coming year. Although I am fairly new to Council, I am not new to the city, and I am finding that many of my education field skills are applicable to the role of Chair. At the same time, I am learning how the duties and responsibilities of Council, Staff and City Committees, need to be integral in order for our City Government to be effective and efficient.

The Bath City Council is responsible for implementing policy that protects and improves the quality of life and the well-being of its citizens. It operates on an annual cycle that is organized after the November elections. The one consistent element of the City Council is that its membership is constantly changing!

Our current Council of nine, brings rich and varied work experience to their Council seats. Our experience and backgrounds span from education, human resources, program development, and law enforcement, to business, finance, law, and information governance. Our collective residence in the City of Bath totals 215 years which means we, as a group, average 24 years of residence a piece in our fair city. The Council is becoming a more diverse body each year. As we look further into the 21st century and tackle the pressing needs of climate resilience, housing availability and shifting demographics, we need civic minded citizens with varied backgrounds to get involved, run for office and represent their Ward constituents.

In the past year, the City has accomplished a wide range of initiatives and projects, but at the end of the day, nothing gets done without the efforts and expertise of City staff who work hard under the excellent leadership of our dedicated City Manager, Marc Meyers. This year the city created and refashioned two new positions: the Director of Sustainability and Environment and the City Arborist position. Rod Melanson now fills the former position and brings a wealth of experience from his prior work as a Planner in Topsham. Jack Hernandez, a Bath native, fills the latter position, and brings both the practical and policy elements of Arborist training to his work.

Other Accomplishments and Ongoing Projects include:



- An update to the Comprehensive Plan that will guide the policy, projects and growth of the City over the next 10 years.
- A fortuitous temporary rehousing of the Dike Newell School in the old Morse High School Vocational School location.
- Voter passage of a bond ordinance to build a new Fire Station on part of the old Morse High School property.
- Completion of the Guilford Lot section of the Riverwalk project.
- Council passage of Ordinances to allow food trucks in the downtown Guilford Lot vicinity.

Lastly, I would be remiss if I didn't mention the varied work taking place within City committees. City Committees range from Community and Economic Development, Climate Action, Bike Ped and Transportation to the Winnegance River Herring Commission. Most committees consist of citizens, staff and Councilors. I am constantly impressed by the passion and team player approach, that so many committee members bring to their work.

Bath continues to be a unique community, within the Midcoast Maine region. With careful planning, volunteer input, good communication, skilled staff and civic-minded Councilors, we can continue to build a better Bath!

Dear Friends and Residents of Bath,

I am honored to continue serving you as your State Senator from Sagadahoc County. This is my fourth and final term in the Maine Senate. During the 131st Legislature, I promise to work hard to help you and your families.

December 7 was Swearing-In Day. Normally, Swearing-In Day is an event for celebration and photos. This time was different. My colleagues and I heard from many of you that you are worried about paying for high heating costs or having no place to call home this winter. That's why – on the very first day – the Legislature voted on Governor Mill's emergency winter heating and housing relief bill. Although I proudly voted in favor of getting immediate relief to Mainers, we could not get the necessary two-thirds vote.

I was disappointed that a handful of out-of-touch State Senators blocked Mainers from getting relief before the holidays, but we did not give up. I was proud to sit on the temporary Appropriations and Financial Affairs Committee that conducted a public hearing for a nearly identical emergency winter heating and housing relief bill. During the five-hour public hearing I heard exactly what you had already been telling me: the need for help was urgent and widespread.

On January 4, we voted on this second bill. I was relieved that it passed both the House and Senate. Governor Mills signed it into law on that same day. At the stroke of her pen, the funds allocated for additional Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) benefits became available. At the same time, Maine Revenue Services is preparing to send out the \$450 winter relief payments to nearly 900,000 Mainers. This was a big one-time action that I'm hopeful will help Mainers get through the winter.

But we aren't stopping there. As the re-elected Senate Majority Leader and a member of the newly formed Joint Select Committee on Housing, I am looking forward to developing longer-term solutions to the heating and housing crisis in Maine. Whether it's building more affordable, workforce housing or reducing our over-reliance on fossil fuels, there is more work to do.

I hope this letter finds you well. It is my honor and privilege to serve the people of Maine's First District in Washington, DC, and I appreciate the opportunity to share this annual update with you.

This past year, our state faced unprecedented challenges, mirroring the difficulties experienced by communities across the nation. High inflation rates, a rapidly changing climate, aging infrastructure, and increasing energy costs were among the top concerns I heard while home in the district. Keeping these in mind, I was proud to work with my colleagues in the Maine Delegation to pass historic legislation to bring federal dollars back to our communities.

One of the ways we delivered for Mainers was through the passage of the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) in August. This law provides much-needed assistance to struggling families. With the help of the IRA, Americans will save an average of \$800 per year on health insurance and Medicare beneficiaries will have increased access to medication.

Additionally, the IRA offers billions of dollars to expand rebate programs for Americans who wish to make their homes more energy efficient. Homeowners can now receive up to a 30 percent tax incentive for the cost of home solar installations and a 30 percent incentive when investing in a heat pump. Over the next decade, these rebates will offer Mainers thousands of dollars in savings while decreasing fuel costs for winters to come.

In 2022, Congress also passed meaningful legislation to help create skilled jobs in the construction, manufacturing, and engineering sectors. The Creating Helpful Incentives to Produce Semiconductors (CHIPS) Act will allow the U.S. to advance its leadership in the development of semiconductors used in the manufacturing of computers, cell phones, cars, and numerous other technologies we rely on. By developing this industry at home, we can bolster our national security and lessen our reliance on foreign technology.

As I look toward this Congress, I am excited to work with my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to improve the lives of Maine people. It is critically important that we continue to take action to increase job growth, decrease inflation, take measures to promote our national security and invest in our health care and education systems.

Each year my office receives over 40,000 calls, letters, and emails from Mainers. I recognize the tremendous trust you place in having me represent you in Washington and by sharing your stories, thoughts, and concerns. Please rest assured, I will continue to fight for the interests of Mainers in Congress, and my staff and I will do everything we can to ensure your needs are met.

#### Dear Friends,

I've often thought that Maine is just one big small town connected by long roads. Well, in the past year or two, those roads have gotten steeper and bumpier as we dealt with an unprecedented pandemic and the resulting economic troubles.

As we faced the historic challenges, something impressive happened. We came together and lent a hand to our neighbors wherever we could to keep things running and spirits high.

Down in Washington, Congress tried to help Maine communities get through this struggle, so that our state would come out stronger. To do that, we put in the work and set some things into motion that are already helping Maine people. That's why you hired us, after all.

The pandemic made something we'd known for a while clear: those roads and networks that connect our big town needed repair, improvements, and expansion – from bridges to broadband. So, while Maine was uniting towards a common purpose, Congress came together to pass the *Bipartisan Infrastructure Law* – legislation that makes generational investments in physical infrastructure, broadband connections, harbors, and the energy grid. These efforts will lay the foundation for Maine's 21<sup>st</sup> century economy and make sure even the most rural areas aren't left behind.

Over the last two years, as we drove up and down our state, you couldn't help but see storefronts in trouble and prices rising as the economy struggled through a global recession. And again, while you focused your efforts on getting through the difficult times, Congress took meaningful action. We passed the *American Rescue Plan* in 2021, which enabled Governor Mills and the state of Maine to better meet the health and economic difficulties of the pandemic. At a critical moment it expanded healthcare efforts to confront COVID and invested in the state to keep the economy in far better shape than most others nationwide.

Congress didn't stop there. This year, we took even more concrete steps to cut costs, create jobs, and provide more affordable, cleaner energy. The bipartisan *CHIPS Act* will bring home the manufacturing of the technical components known as "chips" that are used in everything these days – from smartphones to microwaves to cars – and in doing so reduce prices and create good American jobs. We also passed the *Inflation Reduction Act (IRA)* to lower healthcare costs, allow Medicare to negotiate drug prices, and cut energy bills with new rebates for things like heat pumps and solar panels.

Beyond these major investments, we also passed vital legislation to improve the day-to-day lives of Maine people and Americans nationwide. On a bipartisan basis, we expanded health care for veterans exposed to toxins, strengthened protections for marriage equality, supported Ukraine as it fought off a bloody Russian invasion, secured our elections and the peaceful transfer of power, and delivered millions in federal investments to projects up and down our state.

So, as Maine worked to get through hard times, Congress took steps to support our state – and we're already starting to see brighter days ahead. I'm proud to have played a small part down here; it's a true privilege to listen to you, work with you, and build a brighter future for all the incredible people up and down the roads that connect our big small town. Mary and I wish you a happy, and safe 2023.

#### Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the U.S. Senate. I am grateful for the trust that Mainers have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments for our state.

Last year, I secured more than \$500 million for 285 projects from Aroostook County to York County that will promote job creation, workforce training, and economic development; expand access to health care; improve public safety, infrastructure, and community resources; and protect our environment. To address the crisis of soaring inflation and high energy prices, I led efforts to provide \$2 billion in supplemental funds to the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program. In the new Congress that begins in 2023, I expect to be the Vice Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and will continue to champion investments to support Maine's communities and families.

Strengthening our economy and supporting good jobs remain a top priority. Along with the Governor and the rest of the Maine Delegation and the associations representing the lobster industry, I worked to protect our hardworking lobstermen and women by pausing for six years the onerous federal regulations that jeopardize our lobster fishery's very existence. Another ongoing threat to Maine's small businesses is the shortage of workers. That's why I led an effort to push the Administration to nearly double the number of H-2B visas that are critical to our hospitality industry. Additionally, when the Administration proposed to cut the construction of a destroyer to be built by Bath Iron Works, I restored this funding to protect Maine jobs and our national security.

When Maine Veterans' Homes announced last year that it planned to close its facilities in Caribou and Machias, I opposed that decision which would have had such a devastating effect on rural veterans and their families. I am glad that the decision was reversed, and I have secured \$3 million to help with upgrades to these facilities. My *AUTO for Vets Act* also became law, which will help disabled veterans maintain their independence by supporting the purchase of a new adaptive vehicle once a decade.

This past year, Congress demonstrated how effective it can be on behalf of the American people when both parties work together. A few of the bipartisan achievements that I was involved in include the *Respect for Marriage Act*, which will provide certainty to millions of loving couples in same-sex marriages while protecting religious liberties, and the *Electoral Count Reform Act*, which establishes clear guidelines for our system of certifying and counting electoral votes for President and Vice President.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and I have honored that work ethic by showing up for every vote. During my Senate service, I have cast more than 8,500 consecutive votes, never having missed one. I remain committed to doing all that I can to address your community's concerns in 2023. If I may be of assistance to you in any way, I encourage you to contact one of my six state offices.


Bath's 2021-22 tax rate was set at \$20.30 per \$1,000 in valuation, an increase of 1.5% from the 2020-2021 tax year. Although Bath's total taxable valuation declined by 3.7% over the 2020-2021 tax year, a significant increase in the amount of reimbursement from the State of Maine for tax-exempt business personal property helped to offset this reduction.

The money raised through taxation is used to support the budgets of the City, Sagadahoc County, and Regional School District #1. The chart on this page shows the breakdown of how each tax dollar is used.

Reimbursements from the State of Maine for the homestead exemption and business personal property represented 10% of the tax-related revenue received by the City of Bath in FY22 and increased by 37% the previous fiscal year. However, the State's reimbursement for these exemptions is adjusted by a percentage that reflects how closely Bath's property valuations reflect the State's equalized valuation for each tax year.

Because the State of Maine's reimbursements to the City of Bath for homestead exemptions and exempt business personal property have become such a significant portion of our property tax-related revenue, it is essential that the City maintain accurate property

valuations that reflect, on average, the current market valuation of

each property. Our most recent property revaluation was in 2019. However, in order to ensure our property valuations are, on average, reflective of the full market value, Bath taxpayers will see annual adjustments in each property's valuation in future years.

However, changes in property valuations also result in changes to the tax rate. When property values increase, the tax rate can be lower, and when property values go down, a higher tax rate is needed to raise the same amount of money.

Each year, the Assessor's Office analyzes property sales and building permits throughout Bath and updates our records and our valuations to reflect changes to properties, whether the change increases or decreases a property's valuation. In many cases, we seek to visit Bath properties that have changed, to ensure we are accurately describing your property. Thank you for your help in ensuring our property valuations remain fair and equitable for all Bath property owners.

Ongoing duties in the Assessor's office include processing property transfers, reviewing requests for various exemptions, inspecting properties under construction, performing valuation reviews at the request of taxpayers, defending values, and responding to inquiries from taxpayers, appraisers, attorneys, and other interested individuals.

Providing a high level of service, focused on fair and equitable valuation, is our highest priority. Please contact our office if you have any questions regarding assessment of properties in Bath.

### Finance Office

The Finance Office is dedicated to serving all Bath residents and city personnel. The department is responsible to ensure funds are budgeted, expensed, and collected accurately and efficiently. We oversee and administer the City's financial and accounting systems, including the collection and disbursement of all monies for the City. We are responsible for all property and excise tax collection for approximately 3,800 real property and 300 personal property accounts, federal and state grants, parking tickets, various permit & license fee collection, and processing vehicle registrations. Other functions of the department include the weekly payroll processing for the City's full-time and part-time employees, paying all the City's invoices, and billing for any receivables.

The City has a Tax Club program that allows residents of the City of Bath spread out their property tax bill in twelve (12) monthly installments instead of a single payment. The program is only available on a taxpayer's primary residence and is not available on commercial, industrial, personal or rental properties. Tax Club enrollment forms are available in July of each tax year in the Treasurer's Office and are due by August 15th. You must be current on your taxes and the property must be your primary residence in order to be eligible. If you have questions about this program, please contact the Treasurer's Office at (207) 443-8340.

Many of the services we offer, including re-registrations for automobiles, trailers, ATVs, snowmobiles and boats, tax payments, codes permits, and parking fees can be done online; please visit our website at www.cityofbath.com.

The department is responsible for all cash reconciliation and investing the City's funds to ensure proper cash flow and maximum security and liquidity. The Finance Director works closely with the City Manager on the budget process and is responsible for the annual estimate of revenue and preparing a balanced budget. In addition, the Finance Office is responsible for preparing the financial statements and all subsequent notes and schedules. Several important financial statements are located at the

## Codes Enforcement

The Codes Enforcement Office administers local, State, and Federal laws that deal with land use and development. These codes include the building, plumbing, electrical, mechanical, and fire codes, the Land Use Code (zoning ordinance), blasting laws, and assorted other City ordinances (signs, refuse, vacant buildings, sidewalk snow removal, and others.). The Codes Officer also serves at the City's Health Officer, and the ADA Coordinator for City facilities.

The office consists of one full time Codes Officer, a part time/as needed alternate Codes Officer, that does inspections when the Codes Officer is away, and an Administrative Assistant that is shared with the Planning and Development Department.

The Zoning Board of Appeals is a citizen staffed seven-member board that reviews projects and appeals dealing with the City's land use and sign codes. The Board considers requests for variances, replacements of non-conforming uses, relocations of non-conforming structures, sign code waivers, and administrative appeals.

There was one Zoning Board appeal this year, for a single family house variance.

## Planning and Development

The Planning Board reviews applications for Site Plan Approval, Site Plan Amendment, Subdivision Approval, Subdivision Amendment, and Historic District Review. In addition, the Planning Board makes recommendations for changes to the Land Use Code and Zoning Maps to City Council. The reduction in COVID cases in fiscal year 2021-2022 brought about the return of in-person Board and Committee meetings.

There was also an overall reduction in the number of applications to the Board. Most notable is the reduction in Site Plan Approvals from 20 to 8. The chart on this page highlights the number and type of applications that were reviewed in Fiscal Year 2022.

The Planning Board approved a new developmental subdivision, for Grant-Tate Building, LLC, adding 4 new dwelling units to downtown Bath. The Board reviewed and approved a new building for First Federal Savings and loan to be built at the rear of the parcel on Congress Avenue. The Board approved the city's second medical marijuana dispensary.

The Planning Board also worked to define and regulate Accessory Dwelling Units in such a way as to best blend into our existing neighborhoods.

#### Planning & Development Department Initiatives:

- The Office of Sustainability and Environment was created under the Planning & Development Department umbrella. The city hired Rod Melanson as Director of Sustainability & Environment in June 2022.
- Hired Emily Ruger as Director of Community & Economic Development in January 2022.
- The City partnered with the Age-Friendly Communities of the Lower Kennebec to create an Accessory Dwelling Unit communications campaign.
- With support from the Climate Action Commission, the city successfully joined Maine's Climate Resiliency Partnership. The city received funding to conduct a Vulnerability Assessment with

a focus on prioritizing strategies associated with particular climate impacts. Joining the Community Resiliency Partnership

- provided Bath the opportunity to adopt a meaningful Climate Action Resolution.
- With funding from Maine Housing, the city launched the Zoning Code Update project. The city engaged the planning firm Camiros to guide the city through a 18-24 month, community-wide zoning update project. A comprehensive review of the zoning code has not been performed for over 20 years but has become increasingly important due to the ongoing housing crisis.
- Comprehensive Planning efforts have been ongoing. In FY22 the city engaged NorthStar Planning to conduct the "Future Vision of Bath" workshops beginning in FY23. This effort will seek to finalize a submission to the State of Bath's Comprehensive Plan in FY23.
- The Economic Development Committee reviewed, approved, and distributed 11 grants through the Facade Improvement Program for its third year.
- The Bath Development Corporation launched the Micro-Capital Loan Program, providing businesses loans up to \$7,500 for capital expenses.

#### Office of Sustaibility and Evviroment:

The Sustainability Office, partnering with the Bath Climate Action Commission, Kennebec Estuary Land Trust, and the Patten Free Library has developed a series of "Climate Conversations" community forums. The kick off meeting was held in October at the library and featured 'local leaders' speaking towards their roles in sustainability (housing, Bicycle/ pedestrian/ public works infrastructure and social network infrastructure). This kick off had over 70 residents in attendance, and Taco the Town food truck was on site as folks continued their discussion after the event. The Climate Conversation series continues, and has held forums on; natural landscapes (fields and forests), water resources (sea level rise and our shared coastline), and an efficiency Maine discussion on residential offerings. The Series will follow up with more resources and information on energy efficiency upgrades and programs.

The Bath City Council adopted an updated climate resolution in August of 2022. The resolution is bold and ambitious. It sets community wide goals for carbon emission reduction of 80% by 2050, as well as preparing to manage sea level rise.

The Comprehensive Plan has been diligently worked on by staff and committees over the course of 2022. This is a complete update to the 2009 adopted comprehensive plan. The City hired Northstar Planning to undertake community engagement, visioning and future land use planning for the updated Comprehensive Plan.

Through multiple community forums and online surveys we heard from hundreds of residents who shared their visions for Bath. The comprehensive plan is still underway as City Staff, committees, and residents compile a final draft to send to the State for a finding of consistency with the State's Growth Management Act.

# Office of Community and Economic Development:

Zoning Code Update: In Spring 2022, the City of Bath received a grant from MaineHousing for \$80,000 to complete a Zoning Code Update. The City hired the planning consulting firm Camiros to guide this project in Summer 2022. We have completed the initial community engagement of this process. We expect the Zoning Code update to take approximately 24 months.

Façade Grant: In Winter 2022, the City announced our third and final round of façade grant awards. The City provided \$95,623 to 12 downtown property owners.

Micro Capital Loan Program: The Bath Development Corporation created a new loan product in April 2022, the Micro Capital Loan. The loan is for Bath-based businesses and has a two-year repayment schedule with low interest rates. Loans can be used for capital expenses such as equipment, furniture, and machinery.

## Police Department

#### Mission Statement

Our mission is to provide the highest quality police service to our community and to protect the rights of all guaranteed by the Constitution of the United States, the Laws of the State of Maine, and the Ordinances of the City of Bath.

#### Statement of Values

We, the Bath Police Department (est. 1831), have dedicated ourselves to public service. By choosing a career in law enforcement we recognize the community holds us to the highest standards of conduct. We will foster public trust through our commitment to the following values: Community Service, Integrity, and Professionalism.

#### Structure and Staffing

The Bath Police Department, located at 250 Water St. was built in 1988. This building has served us well over the years but has suffered from structural cracking and other minor issues. Our police force from 1988 has changed along with how we conduct law enforcement.

The size of the Department has grown, and our jobs have become more and more complex. Our use of technology had increased as well as the amount of paperwork that is required for all of our activities. Because of this, our building is currently providing only the minimum amount of space needed for modern police operations. The location of our building is situated downtown and in a central part of the City. This allows the public to access our services and allows us to effectively monitor large downtown events like Heritage Days as well as respond quickly to emergency calls in Bath.

Bath officers serve the people of Bath in a variety of public safety roles. We have 19 sworn-officer positions and 5 civilian support staff positions.

The Department is led by the Chief and Deputy Chief. The Patrol Division consists of 3 Patrol Sergeants, 3 Patrol Corporals, and 7 Patrol Officers. The Criminal Investigation Division (CID) consists of 1 Detective Sergeant, 2 Detectives, and 1 School Resource Officer (Morse High School).

The support positions include full-time Parking Enforcement, Animal Control, Administrative Assistant and two Records personnel. We also employ a part time school crossing guard.

Harbormaster duties are performed by two of our sworn officers.

Like many employers, 2022 saw a year of challenges. With retirements/resignations combined with a tough hiring market, we had at least one vacancy for most of 2022. Recruiting and retaining good officers to continue our high-quality service to Bath is a major challenge. We are hopeful the new criminal justice program at Bath Regional Career and Technical Center will serve as a feeder program for young people interested in a career in law enforcement.

#### Notable events of 2022

Bath Police Department received accreditation in early 2022 through the Maine Law Enforcement Accreditation Program (MLEAP). MLEAP is the compilation of what Maine law enforcement professionals believe are the best practices needed to address the most critical tasks of law enforcement in our state. The standards were developed by the Maine Chiefs of Police Association to ensure appropriate protection of citizens' rights, to improve the safety of public safety employees, and to ensure the operational and professional integrity of the law enforcement entity.

Attaining accreditation through MLEAP means that our Department meets or exceeds the 162 identified standards for Maine law enforcement agencies that are applicable to the Department. These standards cover all aspects of law enforcement operations, including the use of force, protection of citizen rights, pursuits, property and evidence management, and patrol and investigative operations.

Being accredited ensures that we have carefully thought about critical issues, have developed policy and procedures, and have systems in place to identify and correct problems.

In January, we instituted a body worn camera program. This not only provides officers the ability to record interactions with the public while handling incidents but offers transparency and the means to ensure our officers are performing to the highest standards. If we receive citizen complaints, we investigate each one, and often refer to the footage on the body camera. The officers have come to greatly appreciate having these cameras.

We are proud of the fact that we continue to have zero complaints of excessive force, and very few regular complaints regarding our performance. We accept and investigate every single complaint that comes in about our officers. Our approach to policing is a community-policing style approach, using de-escalation techniques and modern training to resolve issues before they become serious.

In 2022 we began a new program called Project Lifesaver. This is a national program using radio-location technology to locate people that wander, such as those with Dementia, Alzheimer's, or Autism.



## Police Department

In review of our department's incidents (calls for service) in 2022 we have seen our activity resume to pre-COVID pandemic levels. Notably, there were two high-profile incidents last year including a homicide and a school arson case. We are proud of our department's role in solving both of these cases, which were in partnership with the State Police Major Crimes Unit and the State Fire Marshal's Office, respectively.

Overall, Bath is a very safe place to work and live. We work hard to keep crime at a minimum and address issues in a community policing method, relying on our publics help and being proactive in addressing issues before they become problems

We focused a lot of effort last year on traffic enforcement, utilizing some funding from Bureau of Highway Safety grants, to deter incidents of speeding, impaired driving, distracted driving, pedestrian safety, and handheld cell phone use. We plan to continue as much traffic enforcement as possible in the coming year.

In January 2022 we instituted the South End Residential Parking Program. This was a product of the 2019 South End Transportation Study and in response to the many complaints we receive and observe regarding traffic in and around Bath Iron Works. This program was successful in decreasing the amount of traffic and parking issues in the southend.

Overall, the people of Bath can be proud of our officers. We appreciate the support given to us over the years and do not expect that will change. We truly enjoy serving this community.

I am pleased to present the annual report of the Bath Fire & Rescue Department. As Fire Chief, I'm incredibly proud of the services provided by our men and women to our community and their accomplishments achieved this last year.


During 2022, our department responded to 2,525 calls for service, of which 2,031 were emergency medical calls and 491 were fire calls. All requests for service were handled with expertise, experience, and professionalism which our community expects from Bath Fire & Rescue personnel. Our professionalism, competency and commitment to our citizens reflect the support we receive throughout, from the City Manager's office, City Staff and the City Council who share a common mission to serve our citizens.

In 2022, our department made improvements in several areas. We were able to fill all of our staffing vacancies for the first time since the pandemic began. We are currently employing six firefighters per shift on three shifts with the expectation of hiring an additional firefighter during FY24 to achieve our multi-year staffing goal of four shifts of six, ensuring better coverage and safety for our members. The department would like to acknowledge three members who have elevated their commitment to serve

at a highest level by obtaining their Paramedic Certification. Congratulations to FF/Paramedic Shaun Latulippe, FF/Paramedic Nicole St. Pierre and FF/Paramedic Nathaniel Reed.

Two crucial pieces of equipment in our fleet were also upgraded by the department, namely a 2022 GMC multipurpose service truck with a utility bed, which enables us to keep and deploy specialized equipment that cannot normally be carried on larger fire vehicles. Also, the Deputy Chief's command vehicle will be replaced with a utility hybrid vehicle in 2023, which will provide a reliable command vehicle for several years to come.

One of the more exciting endeavors for the Fire and Rescue department in 2022 was the approval by the voters for a new fire station at the north end of the former Morse High School site. We are extremely excited to start the process of building a new facility that will support our mission and service delivery programs to our community for the next several decades.

## Staffing and Calls

In 2022, the City of Bath Fire & Rescue Department responded to 2031 emergency medical calls and 494 fire related calls, for a total of 2525 service calls. This is a 1.86% increase from the number of calls in 2021. We continuously analyze our current staffing model for efficiency, safety, and the ability to meet the increasing needs of the citizens of Bath.


In 2018, it was recommended to increase our staffing level by four personnel over a period of four years. We hope to add our fourth firefighter during FY '24. This will significantly enhance safety and the quality of services we are able to provide to the City of Bath.

## Training

It is impossible to overstate the importance of training in the world of emergency services. In cases of life-threatening situations, the competence of responders is paramount. The citizens of Bath deserve and expect the very best from us when they call for help. Training ensures that we can provide our community with the highest quality service possible. We accomplish this by doing consistent, relevant, and quality training for our personnel.

Our overall goal in training is to support the services our members deliver through a safe and effective training program. To ensure that we provide the highest level of service to our community, we must provide training that consistently maintains and enhances the knowledge, skills, and abilities of our members.

In 2022, we were able to document 1879 hours of training for our personnel with 279 training classes.

#### What is Public Works?

The Public Works Department constructs, maintains, operates, and reconstructs the infrastructure of Bath. This includes streets, sidewalks, sewers, storm drains, and landfill. The department also performs all snow plowing and road/sidewalk treatment in winter. Staff of the department includes five managerial staff, three mechanics, seven heavy equipment operators, and four truck drivers.

## **Street Paving**

The existing pavement was milled away. New pavement was placed and catch basins and manholes were adjusted by Hagar Enterprises, Inc.

- Oak Grove Avenue (Lincoln to Crawford)
- Judkins Avenue (full length)
- Crack sealing on High Street (Rte. 1 to Webber Ave), North Street (High to Lincoln), Whiskeag Road (Hill House to Oak Grove), and Oak Grove Avenue (Whiskeag to Crawford).

- Judkins Avenue

## Winter Activities

Public Works responded to 27 events requiring treatment and/or plowing of roads and sidewalks. The first event occurred on November 23, 2021, and the last on March 12, 2022. In total, 1,331 tons of salt and 675 tons of sand were used. Bath received approximately 51-inches of snow for the season.

## Sewers

Western Avenue Separation (phase 2) – elimination of 8 catch basins from the sewer system on Western Ave. and Cottage St.

Replaced approximately 500 feet of sewer pipe and eight manholes on cross country line between Academy Street and Cobb Road.

Relined 3,723 linear feet of sewers on Commercial Street, Central Avenue, Seafarer Lane, cross country east of Cottage Street, and cross country near Academy Green.

Submitted Combined Sewer Overflow Master Plan Update to Maine Dept. of Environmental Protection.

Meadow Way Separation – elimination of two catch basins from the sewer system.

Vortex Services performed video inspection and cleaning of sewers and storm drains. A total of 4,668 linear feet of pipe was maintained.

## Other Projects

- Replaced 175 linear feet of sidewalk pavement on the east side of Washington Street starting from the end of the brick portion (north of Centre St.) and proceeding northward.
- Installed new storm drain structures and pipe at the north end of Seekins Drive to improve drainage.
- Repaved the approaches to the railroad crossing on Centre St.
- Completed construction of the Riverwalk from south of the Sagadahoc Bridge, through the Guilford lot, to Commercial Street, and from the Waterfront Park to the north, including a 175 LF raised boardwalk.
- Installed Road Weather Information System (RWIS) to help Public Works' winter road treatments.

#### Maintenance

- 252 requests for work were received (pot hole, ice, sewer problem, litter, etc.)
- 276 requests for work completed
- All streets were swept clean in spring 2022
- Public Works took over responsibility for removal of non-domestic animal road kills.
- Staff painted 275 crosswalks totaling 8,150 linear feet, as well as approximately 300 stop bars, arrows and other lane markings, and parking spaces all around Bath
- On-the-Line, Inc. was contracted and painted approximately 173,000 linear feet of yellow and white lines.
- Floats were placed in the Kennebec River at the North and South Boat Launches and at Waterfront Park in the spring and removed in the fall.

## Division of Solid Waste & Recycling

The Division of Solid Waste & Recycling manages the operation of the Bath Landfill and associated recycling activities. It also has responsibility for oversight of the contract for curbside collection of trash and recyclables with a private contractor, and for the operation of the pay-as-you-throw program.

Construction of Phase 3, the last secure disposal area that can fit on the site, was completed in late 2017. Waste placement started there immediately and it is anticipated that waste placement will continue for 20+ years. Operation of the recycling area continued with single stream and demolition material recycling. Sevee & Maher Engineers, Inc. continued as the primary design consultant and water quality monitoring engineer. Sanborn, Head & Associates continued as a consultant to perform specialized gas monitoring to meet the conditions of the City's air license.



The Bath Landfill

Approximately 5,485 tons of solid waste was placed at the landfill in FY 2022. Of this total, approximately 4,625 tons was municipal solid waste, and 860 tons was construction/demolition debris. Municipal solid waste tonnage by source was as follows:

Sources of municipal or commercial solid waste include: Bath, and the towns of Arrowsic, Bowdoin, Brunswick, Dresden, Georgetown, Harpswell, Phippsburg, Pittston, Richmond, Topsham, Waldoboro, West Bath, Westport, Wiscasset, and Woolwich.

Pine Tree Waste continued to provide curbside collection services of household trash, recycling, Christmas trees, and leaves (in fall and spring) for Bath residents.

A household hazardous waste collection event was held on May 7, 2022. Seventy-five Bath residents dropped off 135 units. Residents of six other nearby towns participated.

Asphalt roof shingle recycling was 173 tons.

A total of 0.61-tons of non-friable asbestos was landfilled.

The landfill collected and pumped 10.6 million gallons of leachate to the wastewater treatment plant.

A total of 1,247 wet tons of dewatered sludge was delivered from the Bath Wastewater Treatment Plant.

The landfill used approximately 9,069 tons of soil for daily cover, intermediate cover preparation, road construction, and erosion protection.

The scale house building was replaced in FY 2022. A new office trailer-style building similar to the existing building was utilized.

Nine groundwater monitoring wells, four surface water sites, and six leachate sampling locations were sampled in FY 2022; low flow sampling techniques were used for the monitoring wells; monitoring sites

were sampled and tested for a modified list of compliance parameters.

Groundwater monitoring wells north and northwest of the old landfill show groundwater impact from landfill leachate. Results of the monitoring program indicate water qualities consistent with the historical record. Some parameters have improved, while other parameters have remained stable or are degrading.

Soil gas migration continued to be monitored through FY 2022. Using a Landtec GEM 5000 gas monitoring device, measurements were taken for carbon dioxide, carbon monoxide, hydrogen sulfide, oxygen, and % LEL (methane). The on-going investigation indicates that landfill gas has not migrated off the landfill site. Monitoring of soil probes will continue.

The Geotechnical Monitoring program started in conjunction with the opening of Phase 3 indicates that the landfill continues to be stable.

# Water Pollution Control Facility

#### General

The Wastewater Treatment and Pumping Department operating budget was \$1,030,676.00. The capital account was \$55,000.00. Total expenditures from the operating budget were \$1,038,571.29 Total expenditures from the capital budget were \$54,647.35.

The on-site staff included Superintendent Bryan Levitt, Chief Operator Mike Orr, Operator Robert Gonzalez, Operator Radu Moldovan, Operator Emery Pinkham, Operator Roland Creamer, Operator Adam Blaney and Mechanic Tristam Dodge The staff is responsible for being always on-call and a staff member is required to be at the plant 365 days of the year. Facility staff are also tasked with responding to more than 250 automated alarms that indicate a problem with the process or equipment.

Throughout the fiscal year, crew members responded to 132 call-ins and completed required testing and inspections every weekend and holiday. There were 21 storm events that exceeded the capacity of the facility and excess flow was directed through high-rate disinfection structures.

## Harvard Pump Station Failure

A wet weather/high flow event in March of 2021 led to a major failure of the Harward Street pump station. The excess flows and clogs during this event caused \$56,731.81 in costs.

## What NOT to Flush!

A few small obstructions can have a snowball effect when it comes to clogs. Removing clogs may require digging in a street, shutting down a pump station, or taking facility equipment offline. These events quickly become costly in time and resources.

Help us out! Do not flush wipes, paper towels, cat litter, fats, grease, oils, etc. Your facility is only equipped to treat human biological waste, wash water, or toilet paper. Anything else that gets flushed does not go away and ends up affecting everybody.



## Wastwater Treatment Facility (Cont'd)

#### Flow Data

A total of 776,087,995 gallons of wastewater were treated at the plant during fiscal year 2020-2021. Of that total, 48,846,380 gallons received only primary treatment due to wet weather CSO activity (6.29%). Not included are the licensed CSOs which totaled 2,027,814 gallons (0.26% of the plant's total flow). There were 21 plant CSOs with 47.38" of rain in the fiscal year and 29 events at the licensed CSO locations outside of the plant. Electricity costs were \$221,821.78 and chemical costs were \$85,716.83.

- 95.13% BOD Removal
- 97.81% TSS Removal
- 2,494,840 pounds of biosolids to the landfill

## Septage Receiving

423,550 gallons of septage were accepted from local septic pumping companies in fiscal year 2021-2022 which resulted in a revenue to the City of \$57,179.25.

## **HOW IT WORKS**



The Bath Water Pollution Control Facility operates and maintains 13 pumping stations around the City as well as the treatment plant. Wastewater coming into the facility from the pump stations goes through different screening systems to remove coarse materials.

From there it receives primary treatment in a clarifier where floatable solids and solids that settle are removed by mechanical means. Those solids are pumped to a separate tank for dewatering. The remaining water will go to an aerated tank where it gets mixed with microorganisms that will remove organics to clean the water.

Microorganisms are removed and the water travels to another tank where it gets disinfected to remove any leftover pathogens followed by chlorine removal so that the now clear wastewater can go into the Kennebec River free of solids and pathogens.

## Parks & Recreation

The Bath Parks & Recreation Department is made up of three divisions – Recreation, Parks & Cemeteries, and Forestry.

#### Recreation Division

The Recreation Division consits of six full-time and multiple seasonal employees and is located at 4 Sheridan Road in the Donald Small School. The Division is responsible for:

- Recreational programming
- Special events for all ages
- Maintaining approximately 60 acres of athletic facilities
- Half acre Community Garden
- Building maintenance for the Donald Small School, the Midcoast Youth Center and Skatepark and the Lambert Park Community Center
- Maintaining winter ice-skating, x-c ski trail grooming, two public playgrounds and collaborating with many outside organizations (i.e. Maine Woods Baseball, Bath Cal Ripken, Maine Mussels Lacrosse, etc.)

## Forestry Division

Bath's Forestry Division consists of one full-time Arborist and one seasonal employee.

The City Arborist is responsible for:

- Maintaining all city-owned trees
- Providing technical assistance to Bath residents
- Promoting forest stewardship in the city
- Maintaining plantings at the Viaduct, Water Street, and the Congress Avenue roundabout
- Managing special forestry projects

The arborist works closely with and is a member of the Bath Community Forestry Committee. BCFC celebrates Arbor Day week in May each year. Spruce seedlings were planted on the Butler Head Preserve in honor of Arbor Day.

Bath has a historical legacy of significant trees and forest stewardship. Bath is ranked second in the Maine for communities with "Champion" trees. Champion trees are the largest examples of each recognized species in the state. Bath is currently home to 10 state champion trees. Bath has been repeatedly recognized by national and state organizations for its commitment to forestry.

Bath has been a National Arbor Day Foundation Tree City USA for 25 years and has been repeatedly recognized by the Maine Forest Service for "Excellence in Urban Forestry."

Bath has 6,000 street-side trees, and more than 14,000 public trees (cemeteries, parks, schools, boat launches, and wooded areas).

## Parks & Cemetaries Division

The division has three full-time employees. Seasonal employees are hired in the spring and work until the grounds are closed for the winter. The Cemeteries & Parks Office is located at 1 Oak Grove Avenue

The division is responsible for:

- All burials and maintenance within the 58 acres of city cemeteries
- Maintenance of the City Park, Waterfront Park,
   North End and South End Boat Launch facilities
   and the South End Park
- Several monument parks and other city-owned properties (approximately 23 acres)

- 88 interments 15 full burials and 73 cremations
- 18 Winter Entombments in the Receiving Vault
- 62 grave spaces sold

- 1,600 veteran graves received a flag placed by volunteers for Memorial Day

## General Assistance

The General Assistance Program is a State mandated, municipally administered financial assistance program. It was designed to be the program of "last resort" for residents of the community who are unable to provide for their basic needs (e.g. food, shelter, fuel, electricity). The City of Bath serves as the General Assistance Office for residents from the City of Bath and the Town of West Bath.

General Assistance meetings are by appointment only. Please call (207) 443-8335 to leave a message with your name and a phone number where we can reach you.

With the exception of "first time" applicants, anyone applying for General Assistance must provide proof of income and how the applicant spent the income for the prior 30 days. Receipts for basic necessities are considered allowed expenses. If applicant is requesting a utility bill to be paid, the bill must be in the applicant's name. If the applicant is unable to work, medical documentation validating their work restrictions is a requirement. Applicants are required to seek work if physically able and/or to apply for assistance from any other program that may be avail-

able to them. A determination of eligibility is made for a thirty-day period based on anticipated earnings.

The Facilities Department is responsible for the maintenance of all city buildings, as well as managing short and long term capital projects.

In addition, the facilities department oversees all City transportation including the trolley and City Bus systems. It is also responsible for a currier system which includes interoffice mailings and all governmental deliveries and postings that need to be made.

## City Messenger

The department is responsible for delivering agendas to committee, board, and council members and other locations where postings are required. Local and national sample ballots are also delivered to various locations by the department.

## Building Maintenance

The Facilities Department maintains existing conditions while always exploring ways to safely improve those conditions taking into consideration cost, efficiency, and effect on environment.

The Police Station, City Hall, and Visitor's Center all fall under the domain of the department. The former Morse High School was added this year.

## City Bus

Bath City Bus provides transportation services Monday through Friday 8 am to 5:30 pm. The city is divided into two regions with the North loop beginning at the top of the hour and the South loop at the bottom of the hour. Both loops begin and end at City Hall and the divider between the loops is Route 1.

## Bath Trolley

The Bath Trolley is a seasonal mode of transportation for local and visitors of Bath

Dear Residents of District 2 in SagadahocCounty,

It is an honor to submit this Annual Report the citizens of Bath and Bowdoinham in Sagadahoc County. The County is fortunate to have such dedicated, capable, and efficient staff and I would like to express my appreciation for every County employee, the level of commitment and professionalism is astounding. I am proud of their efforts and dedication to providing the best possible services. This report provides an overview and highlights their projects and activities of the prior fiscal year.

FY22 saw major changes in the labor market and unprecedented increases in the cost-of-living. It has been a challenge facing small government across the state to maintain adequate staffing levels and to navigate thechanging landscape of employment. The Commissioners of Sagadahoc County were educated on many of the challenges facing their communities through the ARPA funding application process. We learned of criticalneeds at every level: housing, emergency response services, water and sewer infrastructure, childcare, and the list goes on. Six ARPA meetings were held in six months and the Commissioners heard from a total of 20 applicants. Final funding decisions will take place down the road, as the County's own ARPA-funded project progresses. The Commissioners prioritized building Radio Towers to improve public safety communications, and to fix the County Courthouse roof, which was long overdue. The roof repair began in July and is slated to be finished in November 2022.

Budget negotiations during FY22 (for FY23) centered on raising the wages of non-union employees. A 10-year historic review of wages revealed that non-union wage increases were trending behind their union counterparts by 11%. Using a comprehensive wage study, Administration endeavored to raise the non-union wages to the study's mean for each position, and in some cases above the mean, for employees whose longevity needed to be taken into consideration. The Budget Advisory Committee did an amazing job transitioning to a new budget process and in vetting budget requests. In the end, our expense budgets increased by only 2.9%. Decreases in revenue didtranslate into a 4.80% increase to the County taxes to be raised.

In July, the Commissioners held a Special Meeting to address the burgeoning staffing crisis in the County Communications department. Wages for 911 Dispatchers were not keeping up with the cost of living or with competing Communications departments. Low staffing levels necessitated forced call-ins for all Dispatchers on a continuing basis. The constant overtime was wearing down the health and morale of the department. Dispatchers were leaving to find more gainful employment at an alarming rate, and many who stayed were looking for alternatives. The Communications union contract is not due for negotiation until FY24, but Administration and the Commissioners saw the need to act sooner to prevent a shut-down of 911 services. The Commissioners prudently resolved to raise 911 Dispatchers' wages by \$5.00/hour across the board, and in authorizing this increase, the department was able to regain employees and make some excellent lateral transfer hires. In short order, emergency communications were stabilized.

Administration started pre-negotiation meetings, introducing "needs-based negotiation" methods to the upcoming FY24 contract negotiations with the Sagadahoc County Deputy Sheriff's Association Fraternal Order of Police Lodge #752 and Deputy Sheriff's Transport Association Fraternal Order of Police Lodge #752.

I am serving my final term as Commissioner which ends December 31, 2022. I enjoyed serving in this capacity for four years and championing the use of ARPA funds to support a large communications project to build radio towers. I pushed for improved public safety and also served on the MCCA (Maine County Commissioners' Association) and was elected as the Association's Vice President.

Looking forward, the FY23 budget, combining operating, capital, and debt service is \$9,555,077, which is an increase of 4.80% over FY22 at \$9,117,617. Salaries account for the majority of FY23's budgetary increase. The County is still benefitting from employing a self-funded health insurance model, which has given the County more control over increases to the annual health insurance premiums. Finally, it is important to note that costs associated with Two Bridges Regional Jail, including debt service, constitute approximately 35% of the County's total budget.

Administration has been busy with several projects in recent months, including the following:

- Migrating to a new HRIS & Payroll system: ADP.
- Midcoast Corrections Collaborative is working towards the regionalization of Two Bridges Regional Jail (coowned and operated by Lincoln and Sagadahoc Counties) to include Knox and Waldo Counties, and thus all counties of Prosecutorial District 6.
- Creating a new budget template in preparation for the FY24 budget and facilitating the creation of new capital accounts for all departments in an effort to budget for more expense categories long-term and developing targeted capital improvement plans (CIP's). The audit for the year ending June 30, 2021, had no material or significant deficiencies, and we anticipate the same will be true of the audit for FY22.
- The County hired an IT Administrator, who has taken on several large projects, including but limited to: replacing the Spillman server saving 50% on the total project cost, upgraded all laptops for patrol deputy cruisers, situated county with increased internet speed and supported the remote work preparedness by replacing laptops for all critical users within the county, updated several security policies and offered comprehensive technical support to all end users.
- Human Resources has been organizing a complete overhaul and rewrite of the Personnel Policy Handbook, reviewing leave benefits for improvement, adding a DEI (diversity equity and inclusion) policy and revising various policies and procedures to increase transparency and accountability.
- Administration continues to work with the County's economic development agency, the newly organized MCOG (Midcoast Council of Governments) which serves all Sagadahoc communities. Strategic Planning sessions are being held publicly at the municipal level, and participating municipalities are focusing on opportunities for regionalization.
- Administration also continues to work with MCCA (Maine County Commissioners' Association) to track and lobby for positive legislative changes.

As Commissioner of District 2, I will continue to demonstrate my commitment to responsibly providing the best possible services to the citizens of Sagadahoc County. The mission of RSU 1 is to support and challenge students to develop and apply the skills, knowledge, and character to be responsible and productive participants in a global society. The District Educational Plan is focused on employing and retaining high-quality staff, implementing an engaging curriculum and sound instructional practices, providing a safe and respectful learning environment, and collaboratively improving community relations.

COVID-19 relief funding has been instrumental in improving facilities, providing academic intervention support, offering smaller class sizes when needed, and employing additional social work services to provide social and emotional support to students. This funding continues to be critical to the district; however, all relief monies end after the 2023-2024 school year.

RSU 1 has been fortunate to be the recipient of several educational grants bringing innovative programming and support services to our students. At the high school level, Morse received a grant to offer Extended Learning Opportunities (ELOs), which are hands-on, credit-bearing learning experiences outside the traditional classroom. ELOs are highly personalized, relevant opportunities for students to connect their learning to everyday life. These experiences can be in the form of internships, job shadowing, practicums, and other career exploration activities. Bath Tech was also awarded grant funding through Jobs for Maine's Graduates to promote ELOs for students, specifically internship opportunities for second-year CTE students.

The district continues to explore options with the State for the unfortunate fire that destroyed much of the Dike Newell School. We certainly appreciated the community generosity that was displayed during this challenging time. Thank you for your continued support and partnership as we work together to provide a high-quality education for RSU 1 students.

#### **RSU1 Annual Report**

2022 was a remarkable year for the RSU1 community. We lost Dike-Newell school to a fire, had to deal with a triple demic this past fall and continue to help students catch up academically from the covid crisis as we attended to their social and emotional needs. But I use the term remarkable because our faculty, staff, students and families stood together through each crisis, met the challenges and came out stronger in the end.

The evening before Morse High School graduation, Dike-Newell Elementary School burned due to arson. As much as it was a tragedy, everyone pitched in to give the students their final school days outside in tents at Fisher-Mitchell School. The community support was phenomenal which included volunteers, books and supplies. Thanks to the city of Bath, RSU1 was able to reclaim the old Bath Tech building at the Old Morse High and use some of the insurance money to renovate and create a temporary Dike-Newell School for the immediate future while we work with the State DOE to determine how best to build a new elementary school as soon as possible.

Faculty and staff worked diligently to assist students who had fallen behind during covid. RSU1 has increased medical staff and social workers to help students. The administration has become keenly aware of the large need for the social workers. The federal funds that allow for the expanded staffing will run through 2024 but that doesn't mean the need for them will go away.

Breakfast and Lunch continued to remain free as the State of Maine will be funding school lunches for the next two years. This has been a huge benefit to students who are guaranteed breakfast and lunch.

Amidst the challenges the students thrived. Morse has a flourishing foreign exchange student program and the number of afterschool clubs has grown. The AP offerings only get stronger with AP Seminar and AP Research. Bath Tech added Criminal Justice to its highly rated and completely full course offerings. Other schools offered off site programming again through field trips, expanding expeditionary learning and continuing with programs like Boat Building. They also integrated technology with academics allowing students of all ages to participate in storytelling and giving older and younger students the opportunity to work together.

As a community we continue to pursue a new elementary school, develop curriculum and maintain strong social and emotional support for all RSU1 students. With the lifting of covid restrictions many athletic teams made it to the playoffs. RSU1 diligently moves forward, thanks to its professional administration, faculty and staff.

## **BATH HOUSING 2022 ANNUAL REPORT**

Bath Housing focuses on the accessibility of stable housing in Bath. This community is vibrant and growing, and while the housing crisis challenge is daunting, we feel energized and positive about changes ahead. Bath Housing is working collaboratively to weave together needed solutions. Here is a look at what has been accomplished in 2022.

### **NEW PROJECTS**

Bath Housing announced a new, 18-unit apartment building to be built in 2023. It will be energy efficient and walkable to downtown and will support families with modest incomes.

After three years of visioning and hard work, we celebrated the construction start at The Uptown with the Szanton Company. The Uptown preserves the Moses and Columbia blocks and adds 50 new apartments to the ten existing – and is the first new housing in Bath since 2017.

#### **ADVOCACY**

Bath Housing Executive Director Debora Keller shared suggestions and testimony to the Maine legislature several times in 2022, including testimony in support of LD 2003 on behalf of zoning changes and ADUs (Accessory Dwelling Units).

Bath Housing and Patten Free Library presented the history of housing in Bath, from WWI forward – including a robust discussion about challenges we face as a community regarding housing issues.

Bath Housing has been convening regionally with towns, housing organizations, and employers to talk about ways to work together, with an eye towards the 14-mile corridor between Freeport and Bath.

Bath Housing is represented on the City of Bath's Community Development Committee, which spearheaded a zoning update in Bath and the new ADU legislation in Bath.

#### RESIDENT SERVICES

Notable services benefitting our residents include:

- On-site tax prep assistance with AARP, enabling Bath Housing residents to receive \$41,785 in COVID state relief checks, and/or tax refunds from the last two years.
- The second year of on-site food services with Mid Coast Hunger Prevention Program, bringing fresh produce and pantry staples – and weekly meals – to each Bath Housing property.
- The Patten Free Library and Bath Housing launched a new service to help residents master their smartphones, computers, and tablets with a free assistance program. Clients are also assisted with signing up for the FCC's Affordable Connectivity Program, which gives residents access to low-cost Internet service.

#### **COMFORTABLY HOME**

Bath Housing's Comfortably Home is one of 10 programs statewide funded by MaineHousing that provide low-cost, high-impact home safety modifications to support ease of living for older Mainers and people with disabilities. In 2022, Bath Housing — the first to launch the program and a blueprint for others — served its 300<sup>th</sup> Comfortably Home client.

We are proud of all that Bath Housing has done over the last 50+ years to ensure that our community is healthy and resilient – with stable housing at the core. And we are fortunate to work with some of the most extraordinary people in this community – our staff, our board, our residents, the City of Bath, and our community partners.

## The Old Bath Customs House, Inc.

## Annual Report

January, 2023

The Board of Directors of The Old Bath Customs House, Inc. reports that the building remains at full tenancy with only one tenant behind in her rent at this time. We are in communication with this tenant who has experienced many medical issues this past year and expect she will be current very shortly.

We are pleased to report that our Board of Directors remains the same as last year: Chairman Andrew Perry, Secty./Treas. Pamela Allen, Facilities Managers Herman Nichols and David Hudson and Director Anne Dunham.

We continue to employ a part-time custodian (20 hours per week) and rely on Jorgensen Landscaping to do the snow removal work at a cost of just under \$7,500. We aspire to work with City officials in the future to find ways to reduce this cost. We remain members of Maine Municipal to provide our insurance coverage, both Property and Worker's Compensation. Under the umbrella of utility bills, we contract with Maine Natural Gas to fuel our boiler system which is annually inspected for safety and efficiency. As we include heat in addition to parking, electricity, water/sewer and common area custodial services as part of our leases, we are constantly monitoring those costs and ways to lower them. This year, after experiencing an increase in water/sewer bills, we contracted to have all the toilets in the building replaced which has resulted in immediate savings. The elevator must be serviced bi-monthly and inspected annually and we see that fire extinguishers and other safety standards are met in the building.

There is much to be done to maintain the building as one of the great architectural gems of Bath. The roof awaits replacement and we are working with City officials to get that project underway as soon as possible. Several trees on the property need to be pruned or removed and we are working with the City Arborist to get this done.

Again, this year, we were pleased to host many events from petting zoos to spots for vendors to promote their wares during city-wide festivals on the Customs House lawn as well as a monthly Art Hop during June, July and August. The maintenance of the grounds is a priority for the Board to keep this very special building looking its best.

The Bath Historical Society, with the authorship of Nathan Lipfert, published a book this year on the building's history and we were pleased to make a \$500 donation to help fund the printing of this special book. Copies will be distributed by the Society to places where people researching history can use them such as the History Room of the Patten Free Library and the Maine State Library.

Bond proceeds provide current financial resources to governmental funds, but issuing debt increases long-term liabilities in the statement of net position. Repayment of bond principal is an expenditure in the governmental funds, but the repayment reduces long-term liabilities in the statement of net position. The City has bonds that were originally issued for School purposes. These amounts will be funded by Regional School Unit #1 when the debt service payments are due.
