History of the City of Bath



The City of Bath operates under a City Charter, as is required for all cities. This Charter is the written, basic body of laws by which a city will govern itself, similar to a Constitution. Municipal laws are particular laws passed within the framework of the Charter and consistent with State law, to meet certain situations or concerns within the community. Towns in Maine are not required to have charters and are governed under Maine Statute with some Home Rule provisions.

Maine has 23 communities that are classified as cities. Georgetown, which includes Arrowsic and Long Reach (Bath), was established in 1738. On February 17, 1781, the City of Bath was granted a Charter from the General Court of Massachusetts. The Town of Bath, with three Selectmen and a Town Meeting, was formed. In 1847, the town experienced rapid growth driven by the shipbuilding industry and the region's central rail location. Bath was granted a Charter from the State of Maine and became a city.

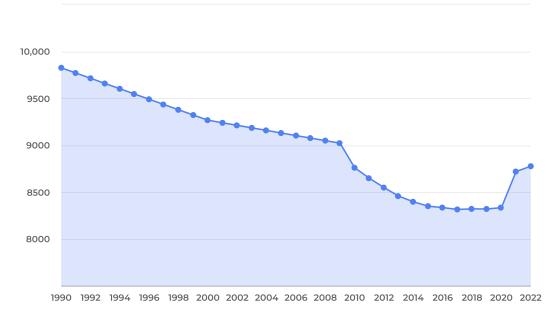

DAYTIME POPULATION

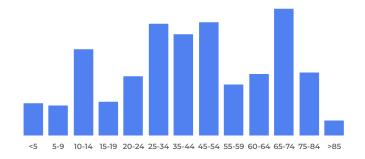

Aging affects the needs and lifestyle choices of residents. Municipalities must adjust and plan services accordingly.

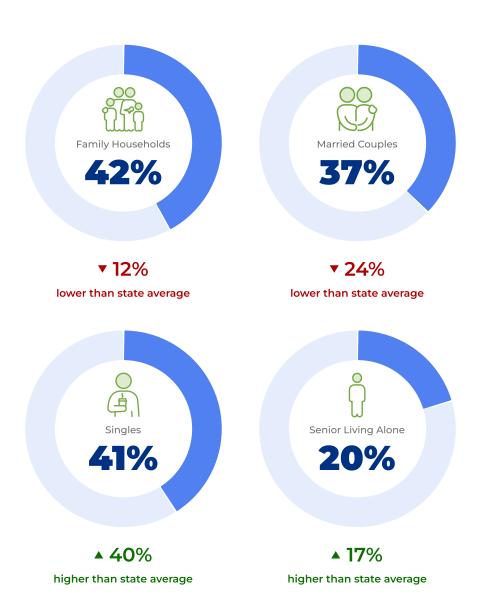

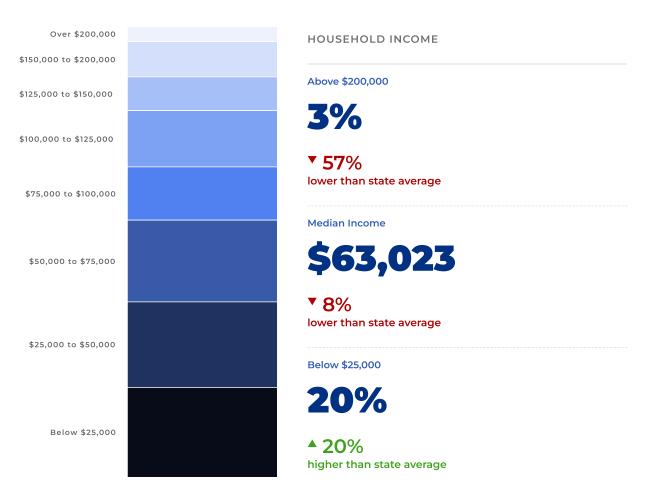
It is important to consider the dynamics of household types to plan for and provide services effectively. Household type also has a general correlation to income levels which affect the tax base.

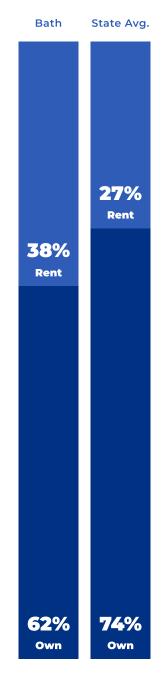
HOME VALUE DISTRIBUTION

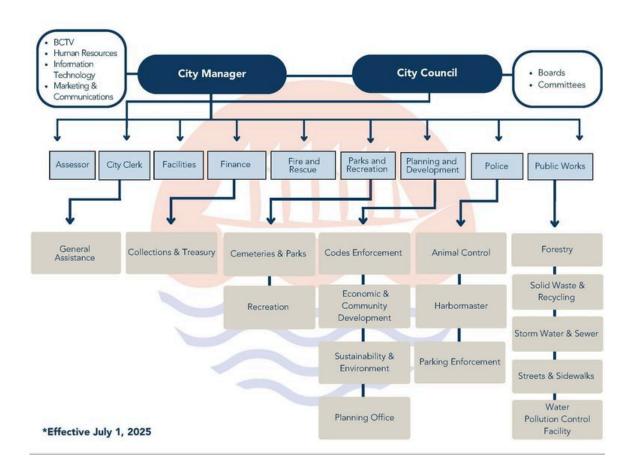

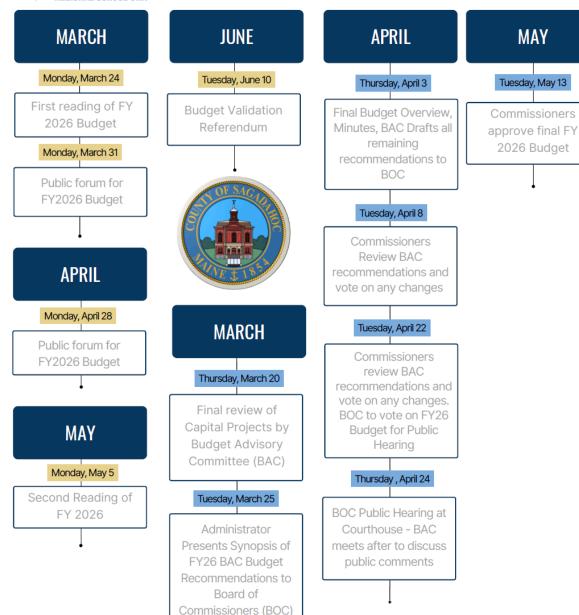

BUDGET OVERVIEW

Budget Summary

2025-2026 Budget BUDGET MESSAGE

The City Council's FY2026 total City of Bath budget is \$22,277,943, increasing \$1,390,814 (6.66% from prior year budget). \$519,500 of that increase is using invested reserves to fund facility improvements. The general fund increased \$310,306 (2.27%) The capital fund is projected to increase \$445,738 (23.75%). The Landfill fund is projected to increase \$111,205 (6.07%) and the sewer fund is projected to increase \$511,837 (17.02%).

Taxes on the CIty side are budgeted to increase \$281,250 (3.01%). (Tax Levy 1.18%) For a \$300,000 that is a tax increase of \$60. The County taxes are budgeted to increase \$147,037 (6.12%). (Tax Levy .62%)

The RSU 1 taxes are budgeted to increase \$824,071 (6.78%). (Tax Levy 3.45%)

Total tax increase is budgeted at 5.24%. A tax increase of \$255 on a property valued at \$300,000.

Bath is a service, educational, recreational and employment center for the region with strong community bonds. To continue and build on that, we plan to:

- Improve accessibility to City Resources

- Allow flexible use of downtown spaces
- Further develop small business support and invest in Main Street Bath
- Improve the appearance of the downtown and preserve historical qualities
- Activate the area under and around the bridge to make it more inviting and useable

Reinvest in legacy assets.

Bath has many built and public assets that can continue to distinctively define and serve the City through deliberate reinvestment and innovation. To build on that, we plan to:

- Encourage reuse of historic and vacant buildings such as the former Morse High School
- Maintain, repair, and make necessary improvements to infrastructure to support community needs
- Improve existing riverfront parks, and increase public access on the Kennebec River
- · Create a Route 1 corridor master plan

Make Bath climate resilient.

Bath will steward valuable natural areas and take bold, proactive steps to prepare for the challenges posed by a changing climate. To accomplish this, we plan to:

- Create a plan for resilience to meet the goals of Bath's Climate Resolution
- Identify and conserve important natural areas that provide benefits for open space, and recreation, and climate resilience
- Take an equity-based approach to environmental conservation and emissions reduction strategies
- Implement sustainable landscape and stormwater management practices

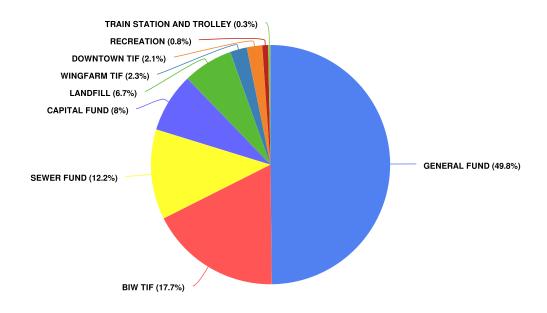

Revenue by Fund

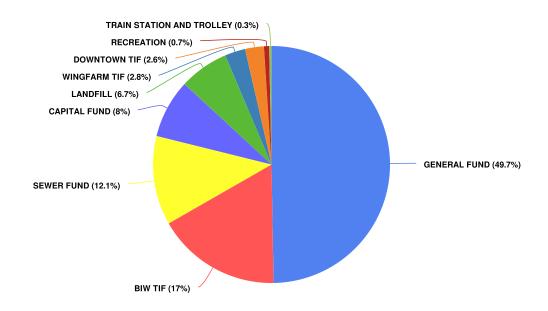

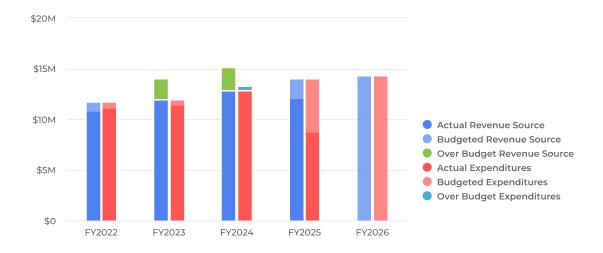

The General Fund is the City's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the general government, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

Summary

The General (01) fund revenues show an increase of \$310,306 (2.2%) By source changes projected include increases in vehicle excise \$75,000 (5.56%), state revenue sharing \$321,131 (19.61%), ambulance billing \$100,000 (15.38%) and taxes \$756,246. The overall tax increase for the city is projected at 3.01% increase, with a general fund increase offset by a decrease in capital fund balance. These increases are offset by a reduction in the use of fund balance of \$844,339. (46.7%). The general fund expenses show an increase in software and services \$90,070 (42.23%), employee benefits \$335,779 (13.67%) and fire and ambulance \$103,543 (4.35%). Additionally, the Patten Free Library has proposed an increase in its allocation \$42,808 (19.8%), The increases in expenses are offset by reductions in Cemeteries and Parks Division \$51,969 (2.5%), Police Department \$53,115 (10%) and debt retirement of \$299,288 (28.70%).

Summary

The Capital Fund expenditures and revenues are increasing by \$550,847 (29.34%). The increase is due to using invested capital reserves to fund facilities upgrades \$687,500. Capital purchases of equipment and vehicles remained flat to last year and capital-financed debt payments have decreased by \$143,250 (8.6%). Property taxes needed to support the Capital Fund have been reduced by \$142,887 (8.5%).

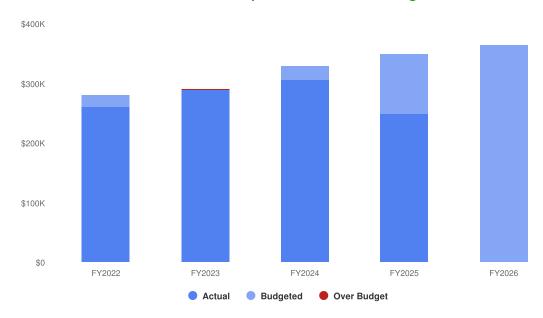


The City Manager is the Chief Administrative Officer for the City and is responsible for all City affairs, including preparation of the budget for the City Council's consideration. The City Manager's Office includes the direct oversight and budgets of Human Resources, Marketing and Communications, Bath Community Television and Information Technology.

The Administration expenditures have a proposed 3.2% increase to \$210,571 (+\$6,589). The primary increase is wages (4.2%) associated with the salary survey and bringing employee wages to market. The Administration budget includes 60% of the City Manager, 100% of the Executive Assistant to the City Manager/ Director of HR, and 25% each for the Economic and Community Development Director and the Marketing and Communications Specialist. As of FY 2026, the Marketing and Communications Specialist position is no longer shared with RSU 1.

The BCTV expenditures are recommended to increase 4.4% (\$154,538, +\$6,164). The primary drivers are wages (4.2%), equipment (700%) and supplies (100%). The equipment and supplies increases are transfers from the Central Services->Computer (01-0030-152) for better accountability. BCTV includes 100% of the IT Coordinator and the Digital Media/IT Helpdesk employees.

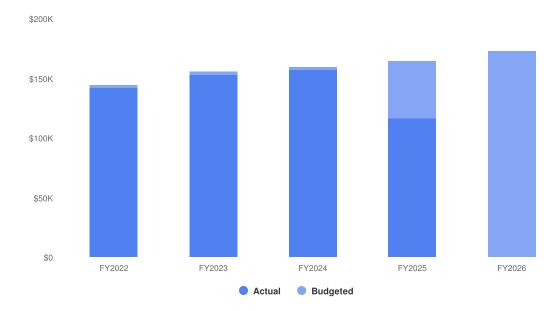

Subscriptions and professional services are related to contractual increases from our vendors (Vision Government Solutions). Training/conferences are adjustments for increased distances for travel to annual conference.

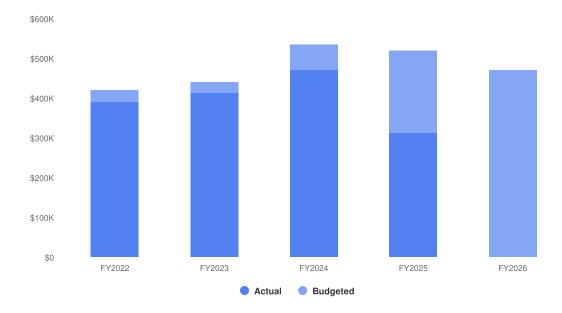
Under the Parks, Recreation and Cemeteries Department, the City's Cemeteries and Parks Division is responsible for all burials, and maintenance of 58 acres of the City's active and inactive cemeteries and the maintenance of City's parks, 23 acres of green spaces and two boat launch facilities. In 2024, the division reset 197 (in-house) and 50 (contracted) stones in Maple Grove and Oak Grove Cemetery, conducted 86 burials (17 full, 69 cremation) and sold 40 grave spaces (24 full and 16 cremations). Twenty veteran markers were installed during the year. It is a state mandate that municipalities cannot charge for foundation/installation of veterans markers.

Expenditures by Function

The Cemeteries and Parks Division budget is recommended to be reduced by 9.2% (\$472,227, -\$47,822). The primary driver of this reduction is cutting the number of seasonal employees to two (-\$149,180, -\$72.9%) and outsourcing cemetery mowing and maintenance (other services, +\$89,000). Additional adjustment for wages (\$7,230, 4.1%) applied materials (\$3,000, +31.6%) appropriately aligns that budget with the higher costs of groundwork, such as loam.

The Cemeteries Division has five full-time positions: Foreman, Heavy Equipment Operator, and Administrative Assistant charged in cemeteries and Downtown Steward and Parks Steward charged to Downtown TIF.

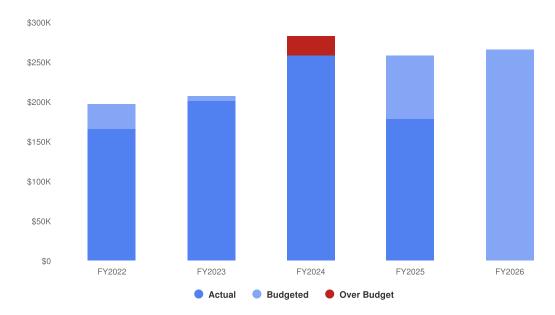
The Office of the City Clerk maintains all City records, conducts elections and voter registration processes, and provides information to City officials and the public, meeting all statutory obligations of the State and the City. In addition, the City's Clerk's Office is responsible for the administration of General Assistance funds.

The City Clerk budget is proposed to increase 4.7% (\$169,973, +\$7,690), which is primarily the increase of wages (+\$6,640). The City Clerk's Office has three full-time positions: City Clerk, Deputy City Clerk and Assistant City Clerk/GA Administrator.

In Elections, the budget is planned to remain flat from FY 2025 (\$19,800).

Health and Welfare, which was shifted to the City Clerk's Office in FY 2025, has a slight increase of 0.4% (\$76,542, \$300).

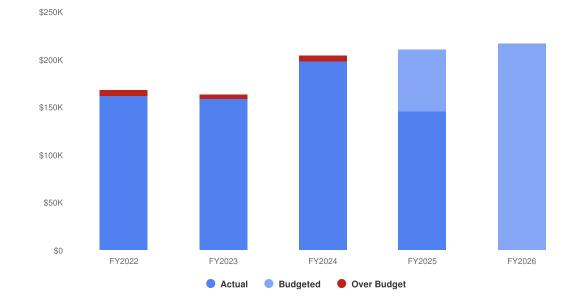

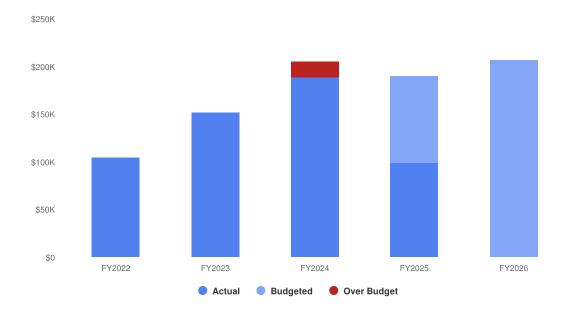

There are additional increases in supplies (106.7%, \$2,400), memberships (971.4%, \$680), travel/mileage (56.3%, +\$900) and telephone (128.6%, +\$900), most of which is due to having two full-time employees who have been here less than one year.

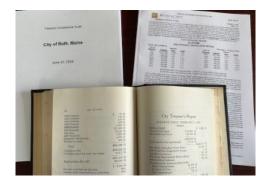

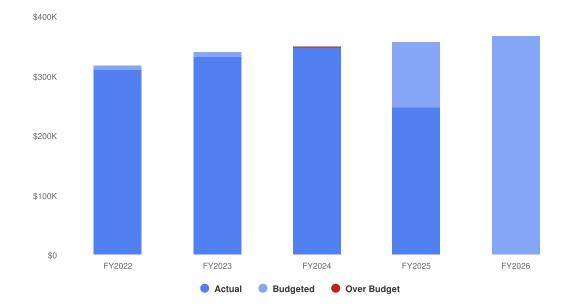
The Finance Department oversees and administers the City's financial and accounting systems, handles weekly payroll processing, pays all the City's invoices, and bills for any receivables. The Treasurers' Department is responsible processing taxes and fees for both City and State. They handle tax collection, including excise taxes, property taxes, and personal property taxes. They process the fees, fines and dues for city departments, including Police, Recreation, and Landfill, as well as the tax and sewer liens and foreclosure processing.

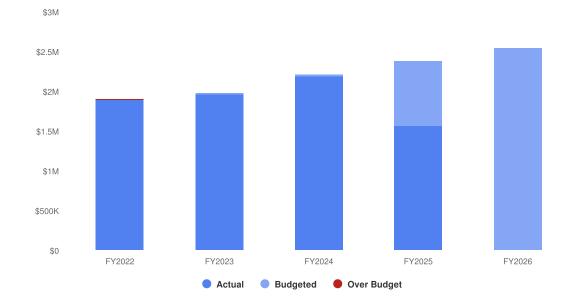
The Fire & Rescue Department is responsible for the prevention of fires, the protection of lives and property against fires and other hazards and providing emergency medical services. In 2024, the department responded to 2,550 emergency medical calls and 485 fire-related calls, for a total of 2474 service calls.

The Fire and Rescue Department budget is increasing 7.1% (\$2,551,641, +\$168,582). The biggest reason for the increase is salaries (9.4%, +\$168,702). In FY 2025, the City utilized \$75,000 Maine EMS Stabilization Grant monies to offset payroll. Those funds are no longer available. Other significant increases includes vehicle maintenance (14.5%, +\$6,220) and other supplies (101.2%, \$15,454). The other supplies increase is mainly driven by the maintenance contract for our stretchers.

The Fire & Rescue Department has 27 full-time employees: Fire Chief, Deputy Fire Chief, Executive Assistant to the Fire Chief, 4 Captains, and 20 Firefighters. In FY 2024, the City completed a four-year investment in staffing to bring the City to six-person shifts.

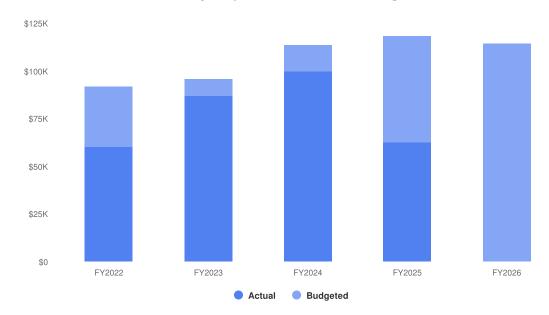
Moving to the Public Works department in FY 2026, the Forestry Division is responsible for care of public trees. There are more than 20,000 public trees in the City.

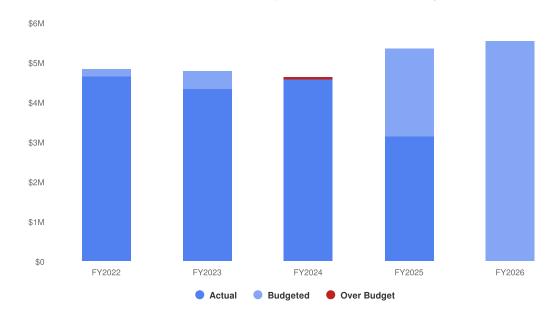

The Other General Fund expenditures are made up of the following departments:

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES - Solicitor and Legal Specialty adjusted to meet actuals. Audit (16.7%) increase in contract and Ambulance Billing (27%) increases in ambulance runs.

COUNCIL - Adjusted to meet actuals.

CENTRAL SERVICES - The largest budget increase is Computer \$81,450 (54,2%) Computer expense includes investment in upgraded internet service with Lincolnville Communications. Additionally, we have replaced copiers in several departments and these reflect the new contracts (46.9%, \$4,220).

QUASI MUNICIPAL - The largest account is Patten Free Library, increasing 22.6% (full detail of the library is below.). The library is approaching the City with a new funding model this year, where the City will pay more per capita (\$26.52) than the other contributing communities (\$23.31).

INSURANCE -Workers' Compensation is going up \$15,000 or 5.5%. This increase is due to increased wages.

EMPLOYEE BENEFITS - Paid Family Medical Leave (\$109,000) is the new state law beginning in 2026. Eligible workers will have up to 12 weeks of paid time off available to take care of a family member with a serious health condition, to bond with a child after birth, fostering or adoption, to care for their own medical needs, to deal with the transition of a family member's impending military deployment or to stay safe after abuse or violence. The contributions for this program began January 1, 2025. There is a training increase of \$16,500 to support Dustin Ward from It Is Time to conduct training with City staff following this spring's equity assessment.

UTILITIES - There is an increase (66.7%, \$30,000) related to streetlights as we adjust the budget following LED conversion. It is still a savings from FY 2023 (\$125,000). The water district does not have a rate increase this year, so fire protection is flat. Utilities also include the payment to Western Maine Transportation for the Bath City Bus.

DEBT RETIREMENT - There is a significant reduction in debt service in the General Fund in FY 2026 as the RSU 1 settlement has been paid off (-\$140,112) and a portion of the 2024 road bond has been transferred to the BIW TIF (-149,912).

Dear Juli, Marc, and Bath City Councilors,

On behalf of the Patten Free Library Board of Trustees, we respectfully request that the City of Bath allocate funds to support the library for the 2025-2026 fiscal year, ensuring continued access to library services for all Bath residents. We are requesting \$232,504, an increase of \$42,808 from last year's request of \$189,696.

The Patten Free Library continues to serve as a vital gathering place and community hub. We have expanded our programming for all ages and seen increased use of our spaces for both individual and group activities. Thanks in part to an ARPA Grant, we now offer private work pods and have equipped our Community Room with videoconferencing technology, making it available for public use.

As a center for literacy and education, we provide storytimes and collections for early literacy, collaborate with the Head Start Program and local homeschooling groups, and offer classes in partnership with the National Digital Equity Center (NDEC) on topics such as internet safety, fraud and scam identification, and computer and iPad basics.

We are also in the midst of a multi-phase project to enhance the building's sustainability and energy efficiency while expanding air conditioning throughout the facility, which is currently limited to a small portion of the building. This initiative includes replacing the aging roof with a better-insulated one, upgrading existing light fixtures to LED with advanced controls, installing heat pumps for both heating and cooling, and implementing a building automation system to optimize HVAC efficiency. Additionally, we plan to install roof-mounted solar panels, which are expected to reduce the library's electricity costs by approximately 50%. We are actively fundraising to support this project.

I look forward to meeting with you in April to share all the exciting things going on at the Library and to discuss our funding request.

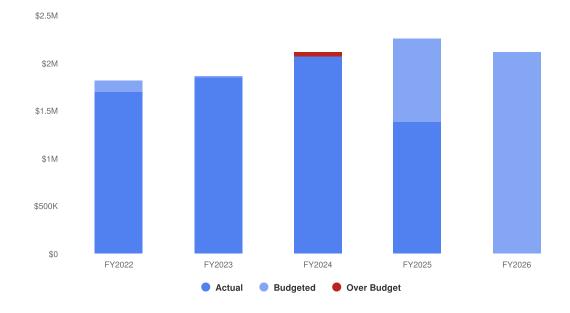
The Police Department serves the people of Bath in a variety of public safety roles. The Bath Police Department is accredited through the Maine Law Enforcement Accreditation Program (MLEAP). The department handled 6,855 calls for service in 2024.

The Police Department budget is proposed to decrease 6.9% (\$1,974,655, -\$145,817). The main factor for this reduction is an adjustment to salaries (-8.5%, -\$148,841) based upon workforce experience and vacant positions, holding one position unbudgeted for 11 months and offsetting the SRO funded by RSU 1. There was also a reduction in vehicle maintenance (-11.9%, -\$5,000). The K-9 stipend (\$2,500) is included for the planned inclusion of a K-9 officer in the capital improvement plan. There are increases in maintenance/computer and equipment for contracts and subscriptions.

The Harbormaster budget increased \$200 (3.5%, \$5,956), so both the Harbormaster and Assistant Harbormaster could attend the annual conference. Harbormaster duties are performed by two sworn officers.

The Parking Enforcement budget is increased 4.7% (\$74,863, +\$3,328) due to the cost of printing tickets.

The Animal Control budget is increased 2% (\$57,714, +\$1,134).

The department has 24 full-time employees including Chief, Deputy Chief, Patrol Division (3 Sergeants, 3 Corporals, and 7 Officers), Criminal Investigation Division (1 Detective Sergeant, 2 Detectives, and 1 School Resource Officer at Morse High School), Parking Enforcement, Animal Control, Administrative Assistant and two Records personnel.

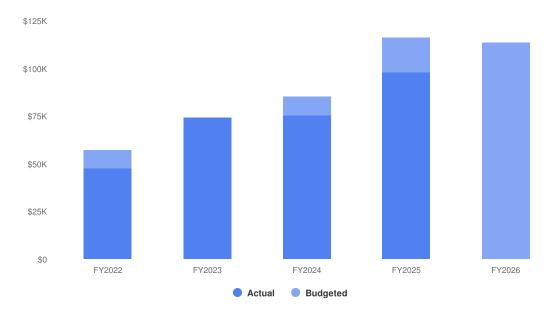

Expenditures by Function

The Planning budget is reduced by 2.4% (\$113,487, -\$2,816) due to shifting a majority of conference expense to the TIF budgets. Additionally, a reduction of \$2,500 was made from other services (previous one time cost for printing comprehensive plan).

This increase in payroll is due to a change in allocation for the Director of Sustainability and Environment and the addition of a Assistant Planner. The Planning budget consists of the Director of Planning (25% Planning/ 75% TIF), the Director of Sustainability and Environment (35% Planning/ 65% TIF), Administrative Assistant (50% Codes, 50% Planning) and the addition of an Assistant Planner (20% planning/ 80%TIF).

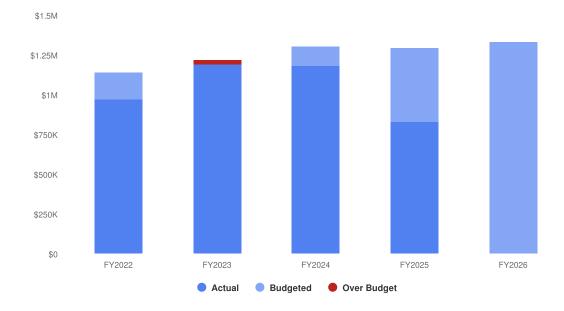
The Public Works Department constructs, maintains, operates, and reconstructs the infrastructure of Bath and performs all snow plowing and road/sidewalk treatment in winter. The Public Works Crew had 308 work orders entered into our system and completed 313 work orders, we responded to 32 sewer complaints and 22 winter events that needed us to treat and/or plow the roads. We used around 1100 ton of salt and 6000 gallons of salt brine. Sand we used just over 181 tons.

The Public Works Department had an increase of 2.8% (\$1,334,532, +\$35,743), but there was significant movement throughout the budget. The biggest increase was salaries (3.9%,27412 and the work order software subscription (\$5,750), which was moved from Central Services-Computer for transparency. Other increases included electricity (13.6%, +\$3,000) and heating (25%, +\$3,000). Reductions in the budget included other supplies (-37.5%, -\$1,200), equipment (-24%, -\$3,150), building and structures (-23.8%, -\$2,500), telephone (-21.4%, -\$1,500) and petroleum (-2.5%, -\$2,000)

The department is staffed by a Director (50% PW, 10% LF, 15% 701, 25% 702), Deputy Director (40% PW, 25 % LF, 15% 701 20% 702), City Engineer (30% PW/ 50% 702/ 20% TIF), Administrative Assistant, Foreman (65% PW, 5% LF, 0% 701, 30% 702), two Mechanics, three Drivers, three Heavy Equipment Operators and a Custodian.

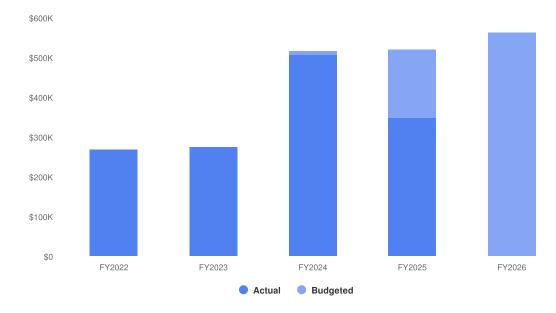
The Recreation Division provides a diverse offering of recreational and leisure opportunities. Over the past year, Recreation programming had 2,340 registrations in 45 different programs and special events and facilities had 6,000 hours of usage.

Expenditures by Function

The Recreation Division is proposed to increase 8.3% (\$564,296, +\$43,401). The primary driver is an additional seasonal employee, which can be found in Temp Pay (59.3%, +\$20,017) and salaries (4%, \$14,234). There are additional increases in housekeeping (50%, +\$2,500) and professional services (55.2%, \$3,200) related to the new facilities at McMann Complex and applied materials (50%, \$5,000), which moved field maintenance from capital projects to operating. In 2024, the Recreation Division was moved to the General Fund. Previously, Recreation was its own fund.

The Recreation Division budget includes five full-time positions (Director, Deputy Director, Foreman, Laborer, Administrative Assistant), part of a custodian and a seasonal employee. If approved, there would be an additional seasonal employee.

Capital

Capital Projects account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major capital assets.

Capital assets, which include property, plant, equipment, and infrastructure assets (e.g., roads, bridges, sidewalks and similar items), are reported in the government-wide financial statements. Department heads submit requests for a five-year plan of capital items and replacements. The Capital fund budget includes only items approved by the City Manager for FY2026. To review all items requested for FY 2026, see spreadsheet below or see the Capital Improvements section for the full one-year plan (both items approved and not approved by the City Manager.) and five-year plan.



Revenue by Department

Capital fund revenue is increasing \$550,847 (29.34%). Property tax is decreasing \$142,887 (8.48%) and Other Income - Contribution from HM Payson \$687,500 to fund facilities projects.

Expenditures by Function

The Capital Fund expenditures and revenues are increasing by \$550,847 (29.34%). The increase is due to using invested capital reserves to fund facilities upgrades (\$687,500). Capital purchases of equipment and vehicles remained flat to last year and capital-financed debt payments have decreased by \$143,250 (8.6%).

The Division of Solid Waste & Recycling manages the operation of the Bath Landfill and associated recycling activities. It also has responsibility for oversight of the contract for curbside collection of trash and recyclables with a private contractor, and for the operation of the pay-as-you-throw program. In 2024, approximately 5,338.9 Tons of Waste Total was brought to the facility (4,640.3 tons of Solid Waste and 698.6 Tons of construction/demolition debris).



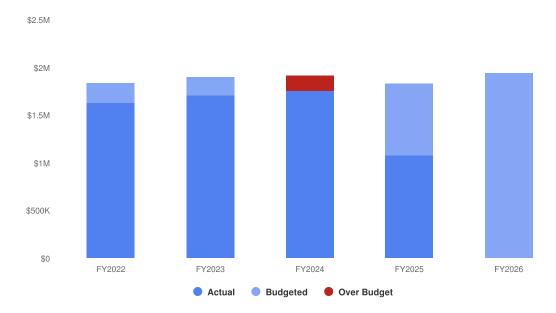
Revenue by Department

The Bath Water Pollution Control Facility operates and maintains 13 pumping stations around the City as well as the treatment plant. The staff is responsible for being on-call continuously and a staff member is required to be at the plant 365 days of the year. Facility staff are also tasked with responding to over 250 automated alarms that indicate a problem with the process or equipment. Throughout the fiscal year, crew members responded to 138 call-ins and completed required testing and inspections every weekend and holiday. There were 24 storm events that exceeded the capacity of the facility and excess flow was directed through high-rate disinfection structures.



Revenue by Department

Sewer revenues are projected to increase \$198,477 (6.6%). The sewer fees are budgeted to increase 5% in anticipation of debt payments on the \$24M sewer bond. Although rates are anticipated to increase 5%, usage is trending lower than in past years.

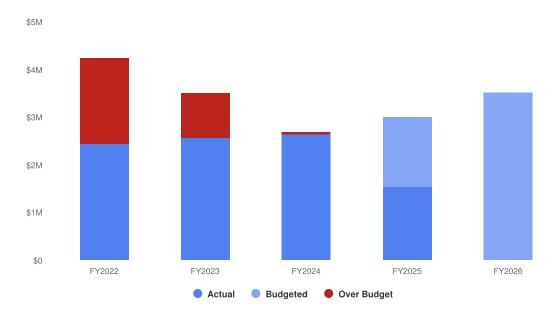

Revenue by Department

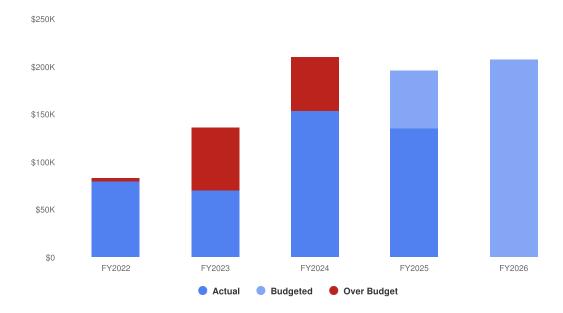

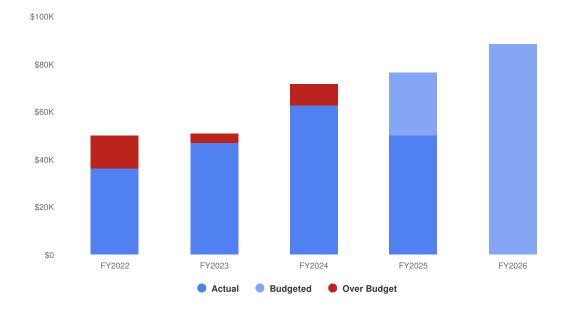

Tax Increment Financing Districts

A Tax Increment Financing Development District (TIF) involves the creation of a geographically defined district in the City and the "capture" or reinvestment of some of the new increased or "incremental" tax revenues generated by new development and business expansion in the District to pay certain costs of development and certain costs of new public facilities, improvements, and programs.

The City of Bath has six TIF Districts:

- 1. Bath Iron Works TIF District (expires June 30, 2027)
- 2. Downtown TIF District (expires June 30, 2038)
- 3. Wing Farm TIF District (expires June 30, 2038)
- 4. Anchorage South AHTIF District (expires June 30, 2055)
- 5. Huse School AHTIF District (expires June 30, 2033)
- 6. Uptown AHTIF District (expires June 30, 2044)

Key Features and Benefits of Municipal TIF and TIF Districts:

- Maintain existing tax revenues
- Enhance future tax revenues generated by new development throughout the City.
- Create long-term, stable employment opportunities for area residents.
- Attract businesses and promote the economic viability and sustainability of the general economy of the City.
- Improve the District and Town infrastructure to attract and retain commercial development and business operations.

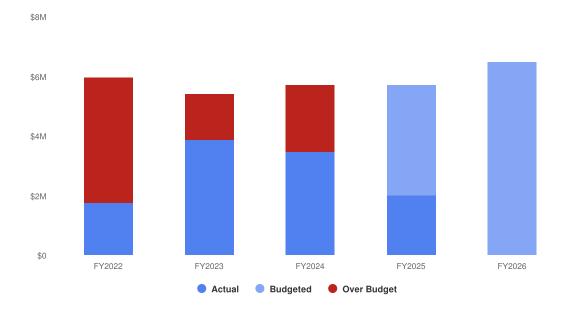

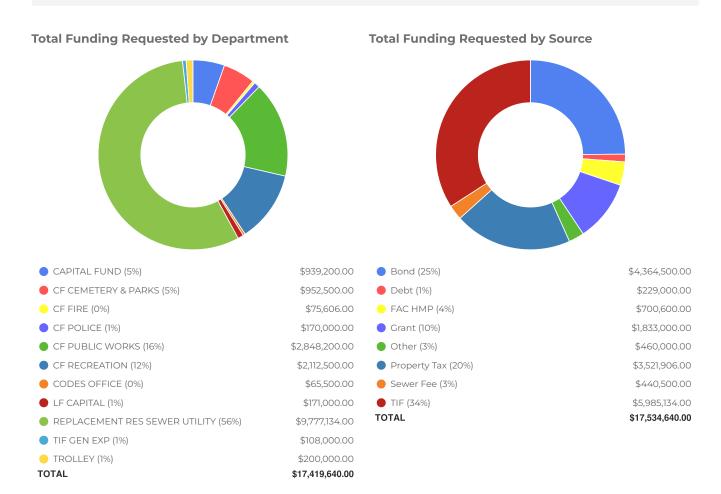

Bathroom Renovation \$150,000

The second floor bathrooms in City Hall are in need of rehabilitation. These facilities are the public restrooms for City Hall and are also used by staff. This project includes replacement of fixtures and plumbing, painting and tiling.

City Hall Bathrooms \$55,000

One of the many immediate action suggestions of the Facilities Assessment Study was to create a public bathroom on the first floor that is ADA compliant. This is most readily accomplished by reconfiguring the Treasury Dept. safe and bathroom into...

City Hall Boiler Controls \$13,100

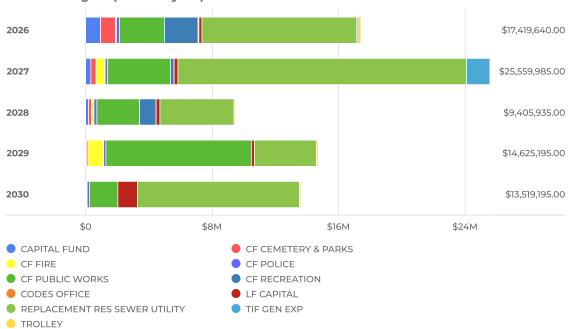

High Street Sewer Replacement

\$50,000

Existing City sewer main that runs from High Street, through the property at #463 High St, to a connection with another sewer running northward, cross country, is collapsing. This project will replace this section of pipe.

Hyde Park Pump Station Modification

\$600,000

The Hyde Park pump station has sanitary sewer overflows during significant wet weather events. Sewer flow monitoring shows there is inflow during wet weather events even though that area is separated from storm flow. The FY25 portion that was...

Landfill Pump Station Modifications

\$115,000

This request will be to construct the needed modifications to reduce breakdowns at the landfill pump station and incorporate improvements to prevent overflows that occur during wet weather events. The modifications would also focus on improving...

Leonard Court Separation \$120,000

Catch basins in the area of the Leonard Court/Quimby Street intersection are connected to the sanitary sewer. These contribute to combined sewer overflows (CSO) and sanitary sewer overflows (SSO) in the Commercial Street drainage...

Overboard Discharge Elimination

\$30,000

Seven existing overboard discharges are at residential properties on upper Washington Street. Consistent with the Comprehensive Plan Update, the project will evaluate the discharges and propose improvements to the City infrastructure to...

Pigging equipment \$10,500

Force main pigging is the process of pushing foam, bullet-shaped scouring sponges through a force main to clean it. The Bath landfill needs the force main cleaned 1 to 2 times per year to prevent violations. Other force mains need to be cleaned...

Pine Street Sewer Repair \$100,000

Existing cross country sewer pipe has sags, roots, and collapsing portions reducing flow capacity, allowing infiltration of groundwater, and contributing to combined sewer overflows (CSO) and sanitary sewer overflows (SSO) in the Castine drainage...

Plant Water System - Water Pollution Control Facility Upgrade Phase 2

\$594,000

The existing plant water system is malfunctioning frequently, beyond its useful life and parts are becoming obsolete. The current system was installed in the 1990s. The system is used constantly and provides wash water and process water from the...

Primary Clarifiers upgrade with covers - Water Pollution Control Facility Upgrade Phase 2

\$1,682,000

The Water Pollution Control Facility operates two primary clarifiers that are beyond their useful life. Staff had to make emergency repairs and welds to keep each unit going. The units are over 30 years old and are critical for wastewater...

Pump and Blower Electrical Upgrade - Water Pollution Control Facility Phase 2

\$2,563,000

This request is to upgrade the electrical equipment for the high voltage room. Some of the motor control centers trip between power flickers or failures and will need to be replaced soon. Timers and controls are obsolete as well. This request is...

Pump Rebuild Project \$290,000

Continued scheduled rebuilding of pumps and valves. This project allows staff to keep pumps in optimal shape to help minimize sanitary sewer or combined sewer overflows. It allows the department to keep parts on hand to do emergency repairs caused...

Rehabilitation of force mains \$2,670,000

Force mains that were installed as part of the CWA in the late 1960s and the early 1970s are at or beyond their useful life. New advances in pipe-lining technologies may extend the life of Bath's smaller force mains. The cost of relining is...

Richardson Street Storm Drain Separations

\$2,730,134

Catch basins on Richardson St, West St, and High St are connected to the sanitary sewer. These contribute to combined sewer overflows (CSO) in both the Commercial Street and Castine Avenue drainage areas. Storm drains on...

Rose Street Pump Station Upgrade

\$1,200,000

The Rose Street pump station has an antiquated electrical system and parts are no longer available. When the sewage flow from the Hunt Street pump station is redirected, Rose Street will need to be downsized. This is a project in the 2023...

Secondary Clarifier Upgrade - Water Pollution Control Facility Upgrade Phase 3

\$2 489 00

The project will replace the equipment in the three secondary clarifiers, resurface the tanks, and replace critical piping. This is a midterm, 5-10 year, project in the Fiscal Sustainability Plan.

Sewer Camera \$150,000

Existing Sewer Camera consistently needs expensive repairs. The camera system is used frequently for sewer inspections to evaluate the condition of pipes.

Sewer Relining - Middle & Commercial

\$720,000

Existing sewers along the railroad tracks and on Washington Street near Bath Iron Works are allowing groundwater infiltration. Reline the sewers to reestablish integrity and reduce or eliminate groundwater infiltration. This project...

Sewer Replacement and Expansion near 934 High Street

\$500,000

Repeated problems with sewer services from several properties and their connections to an existing City sewer main that passes under a home. Construct new sewer within public right-of-way and reconnect all services. In the vicinity of...

This project replaces the 9 pumps in the Blower Building. Four of them were installed in the 1990s. It also replaces ancillary equipment (grinders, control panels, flow meters) and all the link seals in the downstairs portion of the building.

Sludge Tank Mixing Upgrade - Water Pollution Control Facility Upgrade Phase 2

\$526,000

The diffuser mixing system for Sludge Holding Tanks #1 and #2 is over 30 years old and no longer functions correctly. All the coarse air diffusers are brittle, cracked or broken, and the lines are broken in spots as well. The request replaces the...

Sludge Truck/Rolloff Vehicle

\$250,000

The 2007 Sterling LT9500 with a 20-yard polybox container is nearing the end of its useful life. This vehicle is shared by Wastewater for biosolids disposal, Landfill for demolition and recycling, and Public Works for snow removal. Purchase...

Vacuum Truck Rehabilitation

\$100,000

Existing vacuum truck is used in sewer repair and construction, and in other situations requiring delicate excavation. Due to the significant cost of replacement, it is proposed to perform a major rehabilitation when the machine is approximately...

VIP Force Main Section Replacement

\$100,000

The force main from the pump station behind the VIP Auto Parts store on State Rd has had two breaks in the last couple of years. Maine DOT is planning a project to reconfigure the on/off ramps from Route 1 to State Road. The portion of the...

Walker Street Separation

\$200,000

Catch basins in the area of the Walker Street/High Street intersection are connected to the sanitary sewer. These contribute to combined sewer overflows (CSO) and sanitary sewer overflows (SSO) in the Commercial Street drainage...

Water Pollution Control Facility Hydraulic Analysis

\$27,500

As pump stations are updated to eliminate illegal sanitary sewer overflows and minimize regulated combined sewer overflows, a hydraulic analysis at the Water Pollution Control Facility will provide data on the maximum capacity that the treatment...

Watertight Manhole Covers

\$50,000

Sea level rise may cause portions of the sewer system to be covered with river/storm water. If that water penetrates the cover to enter the sewer system, at best the City would have greater expenses to pump and treat the extra water, and at worst...

YMCA Parking Lot Sewer Repair

\$120,000

York St to School St Infiltration/Inflow Investigation, Engineering, and Construction
